It was great to see the familiar faces and hear the voices of the gang. Soon you found yourself falling into a routine, and things really didn't seem so different from last year.




Studying, guiding, grading, testing, and yet smiling, MHS teachers learned from their students as well as taught them. They were an integral part of school life.









In 14-13 Upset Win Over Cameron

Steve Estep, Ram quarterback, headed Madison's offense which totaled 145 yards rushing and 119 passing. Estep and Eddie Carroll shined in the backfield for the Big Orange, both with large gains in the air and on the ground.

Cameron tallied two quick touchdowns early in the 1st quarter, but the Big Orange would not be stopped. Determination and real team effort gave the rest of the game to the Rams.

An 11-yard pass to Craig Carter from Estep for the TD and another toss to Terry Mathis for the PAT altered the score to 13-7 at halftime. Using every

play that the orange-clad men had mastered, Coach Bill Brimm and his fighting team kept the opposing team continually confused defensively. A play improvised during a time out yielded the winning TD.

Late in the 4th Quarter, Mike Santi jolted the six yards to tie the score and a throw to Phil North gave the Rams the winning point.

Team performance and determination reigned victorious as Madison pulled out with a one-point edge over undefeated Cameron. The Rams ended the year 4 - 5 - 1 with three consecutive wins and the sweetest victory of the year.

Reed Hawkins rushed for 88 yards with David Belt close behind at 85.

Hawkins started things off in the first half by scoring a touchdown. The extra point was missed and the score was 6-0. Two Rivers marched down the field several times only to be stopped cold in Ram territory. The second half Madison capped a drive with David Belt going 3 yards for the touchdown. The extra point was good on a run by Belt.

John Gray, Fred Najar, Ricky Sloan, and Billy Rucker added that extra punch to the defense which kept Two Rivers from scoring.

Ram Surge Stopped In Donelson Tilt

Madison beat the Dons every way except in points. The Rams had 17 first downs to Donelson's 7. The Rams also racked up 290 yards total offense which was far better than the Dons.

Donelson did all of their scoring the first half making it 20-0 going into the dressing room at half-time. When the second half began the Rams started their long trip uphill. Reed Hawkins scored first making the score 20-6.

Steve Young added the point after touchdown. Eddie Carroll came into the spotlight in the fourth quarter by scoring on a 2-yard plunge. The extra point was missed and the score stood 20-13. With time running out the Rams headed for the goal line again but never crossed over. The game ended 20-13 with the Rams fighting until the final whistle.

Reed Hawkins grounded out 84 yards rushing while Eddie Carroll and David Belt added 66 and 51 yards respectively.






Madison lineman, Shorty Sloan rushes in to block a Don pass.




With a burst of strength, Ryan quickly scored three times late in the fourth quarter.

For their outstanding play, Jimmy Cartwright, Robert Harrison, and Steve Estep were placed on the weekly NIL checklist.



Throughout the year the Library Lassies have aimed at the purpose of their club which is to promote usage of the library, promote interest in reading, and to aid students in the library.









After 2 more defeats, the Ramettes met Joelton again, this time ready to win. Determination paid off with the final score 49-42 in favor of the Rams.



Hard work, determination, and team ability paved the way of the Ramettes for a great 1967-'68 year!




Vicki Lance "swishes" through another basket in a 55-37 victory over the Maplewood Panthers.




Bessie Marshall goes high into the air for a rebound against Rose Palmer of the Goodlettsville Trojans.





Spring sports have become increasingly important at Madison. With the enthusiasm of the athletes, these sports gained popularity in 1968.








Regional play again pitted the Big Orange against M.B.A. Winning this game 5-1, the Rams were on the road to Kingsport and the State Tournament.



However, it was not all hard work, Juniors attended their first class meetings, ordered class rings, and received the reward of a successful dance.


